FAVORITES ADVANCE ALL TEAMS TIED IN TENNIS TOURNAMENT AFTER WEEK'S PLAY

Action moved along at a fast clip in the doubles tournament last week and this week's play will determine the winning combination. The semi-final round is scheduled for play the first part of the week, and the final round will be played off on Thursday or Friday. The matches thus far have been very interesting, and the last rounds should provide some fine tennis.

The favorites advanced into the semi-finals unscathed. Sutton and McLean scored a win over the team of Marvin-Mitchener and will meet the dark horse combination of Henderson-Capps in the upper bracket. The latter team went into the semi-finals with a victory over Spencer-Sandifer. In the lower bracket the highly-rated McGinnis-Linton team advanced to the semi-finals by eliminating Corner and Dick; they will meet the Wood-Florton combine, winners over Balk and Balk.

The first week's play showed all teams in the softball circuit doing their best and gave promise of a close finish, with no team as yet looking at the possibility of holding down their place for the length of time. Tomorrow's games bring the pre-season favorites together in the plays (and, Balk; Ast. Balk meet the Team-Tumble unit in the other final

Team-Tumble played a scrappy battle with Balk Thursday to the extent of a 10 victory over the boys from Balk. The count was 10-0 at the final time into the last of the seventh, and the winners took advantage of an error and shoved over the run that provided the margin of victory. Balk were too hard to mullow for, Balk struck the score of 10 to eight. The victory drove six runs across the plate in the first two stanzas and was never in danger thereafter.
