Announcement was made in chapel this morning that a brief "ground-breaking" ceremony would be held tomorrow in the pines north of the athletic field at 10:45 a.m. Students, faculty, and administration are invited to be present for the occasion, at which time Dr. J.R. Cunningham will turn the first spade full of earth to initiate the evacuation of the gym site.

Dear Sir:—The words of General
Leopoldo Gómez, the President of Colombia,
and the recent, somewhat discordant
statements of the Spanish Foreign
Minister, regarding the proposed
Treaty of Peace between the United
States and Mexico, are very interesting
indeed.

It is now generally believed that
the United States, at present, is in a position
to demand the withdrawal of the
Spanish troops from the Mexican
territory, and the payment of a large sum
of money.

It is also, I suppose, that the United
States should, in view of the facts,
should not be inclined to accept a
treaty which would give up so

large a portion of the Mexican
territory. The Spanish Foreign
Minister, however, is not
so much interested in the
territory as in the
gold and silver which
he believes are to be
obtained by the
United States.
He has said that
the Spanish Foreign
